




Parashah ויירה

- "He Appeared"
- The Torah portion for this week covers from Genesis 18:1 ...
- all the way through to Genesis 22:24.

What do we find in this portion?

Abraham is sitting by the oaks of Mamre when 3 angels appear



- They will also inform him of the coming judgement of Sodom.
- Abraham will intercede arguing all the way down to a number of 10 righteous men.
- The angels arrive in Sodom meet up with Lot.

- The men of Sodom will attempt to unspeakable things with these "men"
- but Lot will provide the security needed in his house.



 Early in the following morning Lot is advised to take his wife and two daughters and flee for the mountains.



- Abraham moves to Kadesh and Shur
- Abraham, fearing Abimelech, pretends that Sarah is his sister
- and allow her to be taken away by him
- after a vivid dream, Abimelech returns Sarah.

Isaac is born

Isaac is Born




- An incident occurs between Ismael and Isaac after which Hagar is sent away into the wilderness.
- Here they are saved near a well.

Isaac is Born

- Abimelech and Abraham men fight over a well
- but after a discussion, they make covenant at Beersheba.
- Abraham plants a Tamarisk tree.

Isaac is Born



- Finally the portion ends with the Command to sacrifice Isaac
- and the intervention of YHWH with the substitute ram.


Thoughts for this Shabbat

- Are all of these just stories ... are they separate,
- or is there a relationship or parallel between some that we should see?
- These stories all concern Abraham,
- what sort of a servant-leader / father he really is.

We are taught that we should:

- love YHWH with all of our heart, and
- love our neighbour as ourself.

Love YHWH



Don't do anything to harm my neighbour

Do good deeds towards my neighbour

Thoughts for this Shabbat

- May I suggest that the most critical story to understand is the one that we have come to know as the "binding of Isaac",
- and it's the one that we need to get to grips with fully to understand those principles.

Background

 The Canaanites practice sacrificing of children.

God hates this practice – the prophet
 Jeremiah is quick to tells us so.

Jeremiah 19:5

- "They have built the high places of Ba'al, in order to burn up their children in the fire as burnt offerings to Ba'al –
- something I never ordered or said; it never even entered my mind.

Jeremiah 19:6

- Therefore the time is coming," says
 ADONAI, "when this place will no longer
 be called either Tofet or the Ben-Hinnom
 Valley,
- but the Valley of Slaughter."

In a rhetorical question, Micah also asks how this idea can possibly fit into Gods idea of justice and rejects it outright.

Micah 6:7

- Would ADONAl take delight in thousands of rams with ten thousand rivers of olive oil?
- Could I give my firstborn to pay for my crimes, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?


- And finally, we will learn in time that YHWH
 Says -
- "the first born are mine" ...

- How would he therefore sacrifice that which is His,
- unless there is a long term message for us.

Abrahams interaction with mankind

Abrahams interaction with mankind

- A number of instances are described where Abraham's interaction with his neighbour's leave one with a sense of discomfort.
- We are taught that he understands the art of hospitality – evidenced in the manner with which he moves to provide for 3 complete strangers;



- He runs to meet them.
- He offers them water.
- He asks them to rest.

Abraham's hospitality

- But what he provides,
 - is fresh milk,
 - fresh bread, and
 - the meat from a tender calf



BUT!!!

1. Abraham dishonour's his wife

- They have moved from Mamre where they have just been promised
- this time next year you will have a son ... his name will be Isaac, down into the Negev, near Kadesh/Shur ... no reason for the move is provided.
- Abraham has moved there out of freedom of choice.

How Abraham dishonours Sarah

- Now he meets up with Abimelech who likes the beauty of Sarah and takes her to be part of his harem ...
- simply because Abraham cannot stand up for himself, (she is my sister and not my wife) or believe that YHWH would protect them, especially after that amazing promise just a little while back.

How Abraham dishonours Sarah

- Abraham action cause damage not only to Sarah but also to Abimelech –
- we read later that all of Abimelech's wives and slave girls have been made infertile as a result of this lie.

2. Abraham treats Hagar badly


- While they had been waiting for a child ...
 and nothing had happened, Sarah came up
 with the idea of a surrogate mother,
 offering up Hagar as a substitute wife.
- Abraham accepts this idea, Hagar has a son Ismael, who at the age of 13 is circumcised before Isaac is born.

2. Abraham treats Hagar badly

- For all of this time Hagar has some sort of status in the house,
- and the son gets to learn from his father ...
 even accepting the ritual of circumcision.


Isaac son of laughter

• the only son of the promise is born.



Strife in the family!!

Remember they are in the desert.



- Abraham gives
 them (a woman and
 a 13–14 year old
 boy) bread and a
 skin of water ... how
 long would that
 last?
- No donkey or camel to ride on.

2. Abraham treats Hagar badly

- No map to use to find out where to go ... no directions for a safe haven
- (compare this to the treatment of 3 total strangers), and
- we read that Hagar wandered around (i.e. got lost) in the desert near Beersheba.

3. Abraham does not appear to inform Sarah about the request to sacrifice Isaac

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- We will read the Abraham, Isaac and the 2 young men that helped – all journeyed together to the mountain ... however,
- when Abraham comes back we read clearly that Isaac did not travel back with them –
- what had happened between father and son?

Genesis 22:19

- "So Avraham returned to his young men. They got up and went together to Be'er-Sheva,
- and Avraham settled in Be'er-Sheva."

4. Abraham will have a fight with Abimelech over a well at Beersheba

Water in the desert is a scarce commodity ...

- People share water in the desert.
- Abraham is living as a sojourner in the land.
- Years before Abimelech had said ... "here is my land, live where you like"
- ... not take ownership where you like.

Strife in the family

- All of these interactions involving Abraham impact in one way or another on the life of Isaac and the tribes that will follow ...
- the actions of a father are imprinted / have an effect on the next generation children.

A. Hagar's walk in the wilderness and Abraham trip to the mountain - the binding of Isaac.

Abraham's trip to the mountain

- We learn from the WORD that Abraham is "tested".
- You will see that there is an almost perfect fit to the two stories.
- We will at the end have to ask ourselves why,
- and what could this mean to us today.

Genesis 22:1

 "And it was after these things that God tried (Strong's Hebrew 5254)
 Abraham...".

The Hebrew word is "na-sa" and Conveys these messages;

- i) To try / to prove anyone
- ii) To attempt a venture / to make a trial

Abraham's trip to the mountain

- Abraham was NOT tested in the case of Hagar/Ismael,
- but his actions, within the context of loving you neighbour,
- raise concern and what we end up seeing is that there is a strange parallel in both events;

Abraham's trip to the mountain

- 1. God Commands Abraham to sever his relationship with each of his sons.
- 2. Both entail a trial of obedience to an unethical demand of sacrifice.

Genesis 21:14

- 3. Abraham acts with speed in both episodes, with the words ...
 - "So Abraham rose early in the morning...
 Genesis 22:3, repeated verbatim in the next scene.

Genesis 21:14

- 4. Both describe bearing a burden, using the same verbs "to take" and "to place";
- ... And [he] took bread and a skin of water, and gave it to Hagar, putting it on her shoulder with the child and sent her away".

Genesis 22:6

• "Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering and laid it on his son Isaac".

Abraham's trip to the mountain

- 5. Both sons experience near death.
- 6. Both use of the verb ("to send").
- He sent Hagar away and he sends out his hand to take the knife.
- 7. They will both travel some distance.
- Ishmael goes to Paran, and Issac to Mout Moriah.

Genesis 21:19

- 9. God provides a solution:
- "Then God opened her eyes, and she saw a well of water.
- So she went, filled the skin with water and gave the boy water to drink."


Genesis 22:13

- 9. God provides a solution:
- "Abraham sees the ram ..."

Abraham's trip to the mountain


- God swears on oath (irrevocably) that Isaac's descendants will be heir to the covenant as a reward for Abraham's obedience.
- In both cases the parents go about finding of a wife for the son.
- For Isaac, it is Rebekah, descendant of Nahor, Abraham's family.
- Both Isaac and Ishmael establish a "great people"


Some points of difference.



- Hagar "wanders" in the wilderness ... it seems to suggest that she was lost!
- ... while Abraham goes directly to the right place –
- 'they came to the place that YHWH had told him about".

- Both Hagar and Ismael are crying out in the desert
- where God says He
 "heard the boys
 voice" Genesis 21:17
- while we see no mention of any sound from either Abraham or Isaac.





- In Ismael's case the solution is material provision in the form of water i.e. PHYSICAL ...
- while in the case of Isaac the substitution of the ram for his life i.e. SPIRITUAL.

B. Hagar's walk in the wilderness and the children of Israel 40 years wandering in the wilderness.

Hagar's banishment from Abraham

- Hagar carries bread on her shoulder.
- She goes into the wilderness.
- She wanders there.
- There is no water there.
- She and Ishmael almost die there.

Hagar's banishment from Abraham

- They cry, but it is not said they cry to YHWH
- YHWH hears their cry
- YHWH appears to her there and provides water.
- YHWH assures them of His love.
- Ishmael marries an Egyptian, but lives in Paran.

Israel EXODUS from Egypt

- Israel carries bread on their shoulders
- They go into the wilderness.
- They wander there.
- There is no water there.
- They almost die there.
- They cry, but seldom to YHWH

Israel EXODUS from Egypt

- YHWH hears their cry.
- YHWH appears to them and provides water.
- YHWH makes covenant with them at Sinai.
- Israel "marries" with the Egyptian mixed multitude, but lives in the wilderness close to Paran, a staging ground for the conquest of Canaan.

Does Abraham's treatment of his "neighbour" foreshadow the treatment that his grandchildren will suffer?

Is there a consequence due to his behavior?

What are the lessons that we need to learn?

Failure by Abraham to treat both Sarah and Hagar with justice, compassion and in humility resulted in at least three negative consequences.

Abraham's failure to treat Sarah & Hagar with respect

- Abraham has to walk down the same path of pain and loneliness that Hagar does. However,
- Abraham has hope that YHWH will deliver him – after all he has heard these words before ...

Genesis 12:1/Gen 22:2

- Go ye forth from this land ...
- Go ye forth to Mount Moriah ...

2. Abraham's failure to treat Sarah & Hagar with respect

- Abraham descendants will also have to walk through the wilderness for 40 years
- ... dependent on YHWH for food and water.

3. Abraham's failure to treat Sarah & Hagar with respect

- The close family of Abraham will live on earth with the blessing of the PHYSICAL ... in Hagar's case we saw that it was a well of never ending water.
- Later on we will see in the haftorah portion that this changes to oil.

What have the sons of Ishmael been blessed with?...
Oil !!!

Some positives for this week


- While Ishmael receives the physical benefits/blessings we should remember that Isaac is circumcised on the 8th day ... he alone is the Son of the Covenant
- We look for the SPIRITUAL meaning of the physical things...
- Water, and oil

Water ... the water of the WORD 011 ... Fruit of the Holy Spirit ...
